This fund is very popular with individuals, Subordinate Temples, Clubs, and Units who want their full donation to go to the Hospital in the year their gift is made.

Annually the earnings from the CEF and the donations to the CRF are gifted to the Shriners Hospitals for Children® - Canada in Montreal.

The Shriners Hospitals for Children® - Canada built in Montreal in 1925 was replaced with a state-of-the-art facility in 2015. Canadian Daughters of the Nile have raised more than \$6,000,000 in support of Shriners Hospital for Children® - Canada. Live on through the Gift of Giving. The following are some options for donating to the Canadian Foundation as part of your last Will and Testament.

Bequest in your Will

Bequests of a specific dollar amount can be made naming the Canadian Foundation as a beneficiary within the Last Will and Testament.

Life Insurance

There are three ways that life insurance can form a charitable bequest to the Canadian Foundation:

1. Purchase a new policy naming the Canadian Foundation as the beneficiary. This is the simplest way.
2. Name the Canadian Foundation as beneficiary of an existing policy in full or part thereof.
3. Transfer ownership of an existing policy to the Canadian Foundation.

Also, you can name the ESTATE as the beneficiary of a policy, in full or in part thereof, with instructions captured within the Last Will and Testament that proceeds are to be paid to the Canadian Foundation.

Live on through the Gift of Giving.

Gift of Securities*

The benefit of this type of gift or transfer in kind is tremendous as it can increase the amount of your gift without incurring cost. You can gift appreciated public stocks or securities including mutual funds and government bonds. The benefit to the Estate is that currently no capital gains will be due if held in a non-registered account.

RRSP and RRIF Residuals

You may also choose to name the Canadian Foundation as full or partial beneficiary of an RRSP or RRIF.

Charitable Gift Fund*

Establish a Charitable Gift Fund during your living years. This will allow your input as well as the opportunity to see how your donations are being used.

Gifts of Other Forms of Property

Gifts may also be made of other forms of property, such as valuable artworks or land / real estate.

*These gifts can be made during your lifetime.

It is highly recommended to consult with your personal tax accountant, lawyer, or estate planner when determining what is best from an Estate planning perspective.

MEMORIAL GIFTS

Common examples of how to remember the Canadian Foundation in your Will or Trust:

1. SPECIFIC BEQUEST

I give and bequest (\$_____ specific dollar figure or description of property) to the Convalescent Endowment Fund of the registered charity whose legal name is "Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Relief Fund and Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Endowment Fund" and whose alternate name is the Canadian Foundation. My Gift shall be used at the discretion of the Trustees of the Canadian Foundation.

2. PERCENTAGE BEQUEST

I give and bequest (_____ % of my estate or trust) to the Convalescent Endowment Fund of the registered charity whose legal name is "Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Relief Fund and Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Endowment Fund" and whose alternate name is the Canadian Foundation. My Gift shall be used at the discretion of the Trustees of the Canadian Foundation.

3. RESIDUARY BEQUEST

I give and bequest the remainder of my estate or trust to the Convalescent Endowment Fund of the registered charity whose legal name is "Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Relief Fund and Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Endowment Fund" and whose alternate name is the Canadian Foundation. My Gift shall be used at the discretion of the Trustees of the Canadian Foundation.

4. CONTINGENT BEQUEST

I give and bequest my assets to my spouse, if my spouse survives me, and if he/she predeceases me, I give my assets to the Convalescent Endowment Fund of the registered charity whose legal name is "Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Relief Fund and Supreme Temple Daughters of the Nile Convalescent Endowment Fund" and whose alternate name is the Canadian Foundation. My Gift shall be used at the discretion of the Trustees of the Canadian Foundation.
